God has put away your sins and given you a fresh start. May God strengthen you in all goodness and by the power of the Holy Spirit (†) keep you in eternal life. Be now at peace, and pray for me a sinner.

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: In those holy mysteries, grant us a pledge of eternal life; through our Savior Jesus Christ, who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A Reading from the Hebrew Scriptures

Exodus 12:1-4, (5-10), 11-14

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. [Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn.] This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. The blood shall be a sign for you on

the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

A Reading from the Gospel of John

John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord---and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, `Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Homily

The Presider then says

While the Israelites were still in bondage in the land of Egypt, the Lord spoke to Moses and his brother Aaron saying: You must speak to the entire community of Israel and say: "On the tenth of this month, each household must take and slaughter a lamb without blemish. You must put some of the blood on the doorposts and lintels of your houses. That night, the lamb is to be eaten roasted over the fire. You shall eat it standing up with your shoes and coats on and with your staff in your hand. You must eat it quickly. This is a passover in honor of the Lord.

On that night I am going to go through the whole land of Egypt and strike down every firstborn in the land, man and beast alike. The blood of the lamb will serve to mark the houses where you live. When I see the blood, I will pass over you and you will escape the destruction."

The Lord also told his people, "From now on, you are to celebrate this Passover as a feast to honor my name. It is to be kept as a day of festival for all generations to come."

Blessed are you, O Lord our God. Blessed are you O Lord our God, who spared our ancestors in faith.

And so, Moses summoned all the elders of Israel, and told them everything that the Lord had commanded him to say. When the Israelites heard the message, they bowed down and worshipped the Lord and did all the Lord had commanded.

And it came to pass that the angel of the Lord struck down the firstborn of all the land of Egypt, but when the angel found a house with the blood on the lintel and door posts he passed over and spared those inside.

Blessed be God in his mercy Blessed be God in his mercy, holy is his name.

And so each year the people of God celebrated the feast in God's honor. Parents explained the meaning to their children and they in turn explained it to their children. "Once we were slaves in the land of Egypt, but the Lord rescued us on this holy night. That is why this night is forever special and different from all other nights."

For many years our ancestors celebrated the Passover. Then at the appointed time, Jesus, God's anointed One, came to celebrate it on his last night with his friends. He left it, and us, changed forever.

On the night before he died, Jesus celebrated the Passover for the last time with his disciples. He knew the end had come. He had always loved those who were his, but now he showed how perfect his love was. They were all seated at the table.

Judas had already yielded to the temptation to betray Jesus as soon as the opportunity arose. Jesus knew that he came from God and was going back to God, and that the Father had put all things in his hands. He got up from the table removed his outer garment and tied a towel around his waist. He came to Simon Peter who asked him "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered "I know you don't understand what I'm doing now, but later you will." Peter exclaimed "You will never wash my feet". Jesus answered Peter "If I do not wash you, you can share nothing with me." Peter relented "Then wash my hands and face as well!"

Blessed be God! Blessed be God in Jesus, who washes us clean.

- 1 My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? * and are so far from my cry and from the words of my distress?
- 2 O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; * by night as well, but I find no rest.

and you have laid me in the dust of the grave.


- 16 Packs of dogs close me in, and gangs of evildoers circle around me; they pierce my hands and my feet; I can count all my bones.
